Day One: Friday, May 17, 2019 (Meals included: L, D)

Arrive at the Coho Motel around 9 am to socialize and enjoy coffee and rolls before departing for the day by coach



bus. Our first stop is Pagel's Ponderosa Dairy Farm. The tour bus will drive through the expansive barns of the largest family owned dairy farm in the state of Wisconsin. Learn about cow comfort and watch the cows go around the carousel as they are milked. Fresh milk is also used immediately to make farm-fresh cheese curds.

After lunch, we head to Alpaca to Apparel where we will see an alpaca being sheared and shop in a unique farm gift shop featuring alpaca garments, farm products, and vintage items. As the afternoon progresses, we will relax at Cold Country Vines & Wines, where we will experience a tour of the facility and sample some of the award winning wines produced from estate grown grapes. Discover why wines from the Wisconsin Ledge rival those of Napa Valley! The day ends with returning to the Coho Motel to check in and then off to Port O' Call for dinner overlooking the Kewaunee harbor channel.

Day Two: Saturday, May 18, 2019 (Meals included: B, L)

The bus will depart the hotel at 8 am, taking us to Kunkel's Korner Restaurant for breakfast. Kunkel's is a family owned and operated establishment that showcases some of Kewaunee's history with photos and antiques. After breakfast, we head to Stangelville, WI, which is home to St. Lawrence Catholic Church, arguably one of the most beautiful churches in the state. Historian David Selner will talk about the early settlers of the Stangelville area. We then head to the Agricultural Heritage Farm for the annual "Spring on the Farm" celebration. Learn about Kewaunee County agriculture from years gone by and enjoy lunch.

The day ends with a walking tour of the Kewaunee Lighthouse and Tug Ludington (f/k/a Wilbur F. Browder), a World War II ear tugboat that participated in the D-Day invasion of Normandy. While walking to the lighthouse, to your left, just under the large hill, is Kewaunee Fabrications, formerly Kewaunee Shipbuilding and Engineering, where the USS Pueblo was built and launched in April 1944. The Pueblo was captured by North Korea on January 23, 1968, and is currently held as a museum ship in North Korea.
