DANA FARM ICE SKATING RINK

The Dana Farm Ice Skating Rink, a project primarily funded with a generous donation from Kewaunee County Farm Technology Days 2017, is an outdoor ice rink that is FREE to use during the months of January and February or as long as the ice is in good condition.

The ice rink, which is located at N3787 Ransom Moore Lane, Kewaunee and adjacent to Winter Park, is typically open to the public seven days a week from the hours of 9am – 8pm and it is lighted for night skating.

Visitors must bring their own skates, rentals are not available. The ice rink is unsupervised, so it is use at your own risk, and the Kewaunee County Promotions & Recreation Department asks that visitors be patient if staff needs to clear snow from the ice.

There is a park shelter with public restrooms that can be used year round, which includes those taking advantage of the 27-hole disc golf course that winds around Winter Park during the warmer months.

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WINTER PARK

Winter Park is best known for snow tubing, skiing, snowboarding, and snowshoeing. The park is typically open to the public on the weekends during the months of January and February.

The snow tubing hill features five lanes approximately 450 feet long with a vertical drop of 70 feet. Getting to the top of the hill is easy as riders can hop on a "Magic Carpet", a standing conveyor belt system that transports visitors up with their tubes in approximately two minutes.

Snow tube riders are required to be at least 42" tall for safety reasons.



The skiing/snowboarding area has five runs some over a quarter mile in length with a 160 foot vertical drop with a T-bar lift that brings skiers and snowboarders to the top. There is also a beginner's hill for those just learning the sport that is equipped with a tow rope lift system.

Visitors are also invited to snowshoe around the park's trail system for FREE.

Winter Park offers ski, snowboard and snowshoe equipment rentals and has a warming chalet with concessions, public restrooms, tables, chairs and storage cubbies.

Winter Park also doubles as a 27-hole disc golf course during spring, summer and fall. It's rated eighth in the state by Disc Golf Course Reviews. The scenic course covers the entire park. You'll find a donation tube located at the park for upkeep.

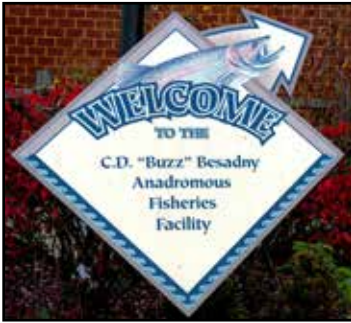

BESADNY ANADROMOUS FISHERY



Where Salmon Eggs are Turned Into Salmon

The Wisconsin Department of Natural Resources (WDNR) operates a fish egg collection station near the City of Kewaunee. The WDNR's Besadny Anadromous Fisheries Facility (BAFF) is nestled in a secluded area along a quiet, scenic stretch of the Kewaunee River. Trout and salmon migrating from Lake Michigan are led by flowing water past two underwater viewing windows to a fish ladder - a series of waterfall-like steps - that leads to

six collection ponds. Fish are moved from the ponds through the spawning process in the building and back to the river - upstream of the barrier dam - to continue their upstream migration.

History in the Making

Trout and salmon have been stocked into Lake Michigan since the early 1960's. Prior to the construction of BAFF, WDNR has relied, at least in part, on other agencies for eggs and/or fish of several species or strains to maintain the trout and salmon sport fishery in Wisconsin waters of Lake Michigan. BAFF is

designed to serve as a collection station for trout and salmon eggs but the staff there also hatch and raise both lake sturgeon and spotted musky for stocking into Lake Michigan and Green Bay respectively. Additionally, BAFF provides a scenic place for the general public to observe migrating fish and to learn about fisheries and other WDNR programs through tours and educational programs offered by the facility.



Why We Do the Things We Do

The primary objective of the WDNR trout and salmon stocking program for Lake Michigan is to provide a diverse sport fishery for anglers. Each year WDNR stocks millions of trout and salmon into Lake Michigan tributary streams to provide a put-grow-and-take in the lake and sport fishery in the tributary streams. Since most Wisconsin tributary streams lack the potential to support adequate natural reproduction, adult trout and salmon must be collected each year and spawned. Their progeny are raised in hatcheries and stocked back into the tributaries to complete the cycle.



BESADNY ANADROMOUS FISHERY

When Can We See the Fish Jumping?

BAFF operates from March through December with exact dates dependent upon spawning migrations of the various fish species. For specific days either see our electronic display sign in the building lobby or call the number listed below. Migration times for the spring steelhead occur from early March through early May. The chinook salmon run begins in mid-September and continues through mid-November. The fall coho salmon run occurs from mid-September through late October. Seeforellen brown trout begin to enter the stream by mid-October and continue to run until the river ices up in late December.

Hours of Operation

The Besadny Fisheries Facility is open to the public for viewing every day of the year during daylight hours. Fish are not always present. However, general spawning migration periods are listed above. Please call the number listed below if you need more information. Special group tours are available and can be arranged by calling the Besadny Facility manager at 920-388-1025. Information and educational displays also lead visitors on a self guided tour and provide basic information on trout and salmon life history, facility operation, and other related subjects.

Grandfather Clock Kewaunee boasts the world's largest grandfather clock at 35' 10", originally built by Svoboda Industries in 1976 for the U.S. Bicentennial Celebration.

Tug Ludington The Ludington, christened the Major Wilbur F. Browder, participated in the D-Day invasion and continued to assist in harbor operations. In 1947, the tug was stationed in Kewaunee by the Army Corps of Engineers.

Railroad Depot Built in the 1890s, the Depot accommodated passenger service from the Green Bay and Western Railroad between Kewaunee and Green Bay; a spur from Kewaunee led to Door County.

Life Saving Station Originally built in 1893, the Life Saving Station was one of many that served as the precursor to U.S. Coast Guard working tirelessly to save lives in a growing shipping industry. The station continued under the Coast Guard until its closure in 1947.

HISTORIC DOWNTOWN WALKING TOUR

Kewaunee Lighthouse As Kewaunee became an increasingly vital port connecting Wisconsin and the Midwest to the Eastern U.S., the Lighthouse served as the centerpiece to assist incoming and outgoing ships.

Priebe Cold Storage (Port O' Call Restaurant) The Priebe Cheese Cold Storage building, built in 1935 replacing the old Crosby and Meyers Cheese House that formerly occupied this site.

Emerald and Dickinson The coal barges, Emerald and Dickinson, sank off the coast of Lake Michigan near Kewaunee on November 17, 1885 leading to the construction of the Life Saving Station.

Light Plant In 1892, a group of citizens requested streetlights from the city council. In 1895, an ordinance was passed to construct an electric light plant. The light plant was finally built in 1908, and Kewaunee got electric lights.

Lakehaven Hall Part of the Hamachek Machine Company established in 1898, included a foundry, planing mill, machine shop and lumber warehouse.

Karsten Hotel In 1858, the Steamboat House was built on the current Karsten Hotel site, serving as a major hub for social activities. On February 14th, 1912, a fire destroyed the building. The hotel is claimed to be home to three spirits: William Karsten, the former owner; Billy Karsten III, his grandson; and Agatha, a maid who had worked and lived at the hotel.

Doctor's Office Considered the oldest doctor's office in Wisconsin, it was built in 1873. Dr. Oliver Martin began practice in Kewaunee on March 2, 1874. It was also the site of the first volunteer-type lending library

Kewaunee Bottling Company (Kewaunee Artisans Center) The Kewaunee Bottling Company aka Pop Shop began in 1919 with one truck and a horse-drawn sled. The company distributed a variety of beers and manufactured Double Cola, Bubble Up, Squirt, Baumeister Root Beer, Orange, Cherry and Cream sodas.

Parkos Mobil This Tudor revival-style Walden Service Station opened in 1931. In 1976, it was sold to Parkos Oil and remains a service station today.



Goodrich Dock The Goodrich boats traveled the Lake Michigan waters in the late 1800s carrying cargo and passengers. Docking in this area, they were near Wanninger's Pea Factory and Seyk's Grain Elevator.



USS Pueblo Between 1941 and 1946, Kewaunee Shipbuilding and Engineering delivered 80 vessels to the U.S. Government. Its most newsworthy ship was the USS Pueblo when, on January 23, 1968, she was captured by the North Koreans; the crew and her captain were accused of espionage.

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MARQUETTE HISTORICAL DISTRICT

The Marquette Historic District is a distinctive residential neighborhood of fine homes located within the heart of Kewaunee. The Marquette Historic District, which is listed in the National Register of Historic Places, consists of forty-three homes. Take a self-guided walking tour on the city streets to experience these showcased homes built in the late 1880's through the early 1900's by some of Kewaunee's most prominent businessmen. Expect to find a variety of Italianate, Second Empire, Queen Anne, Craftsman, Prairie, American Foursquare, and various Period Revival styles of architecture.

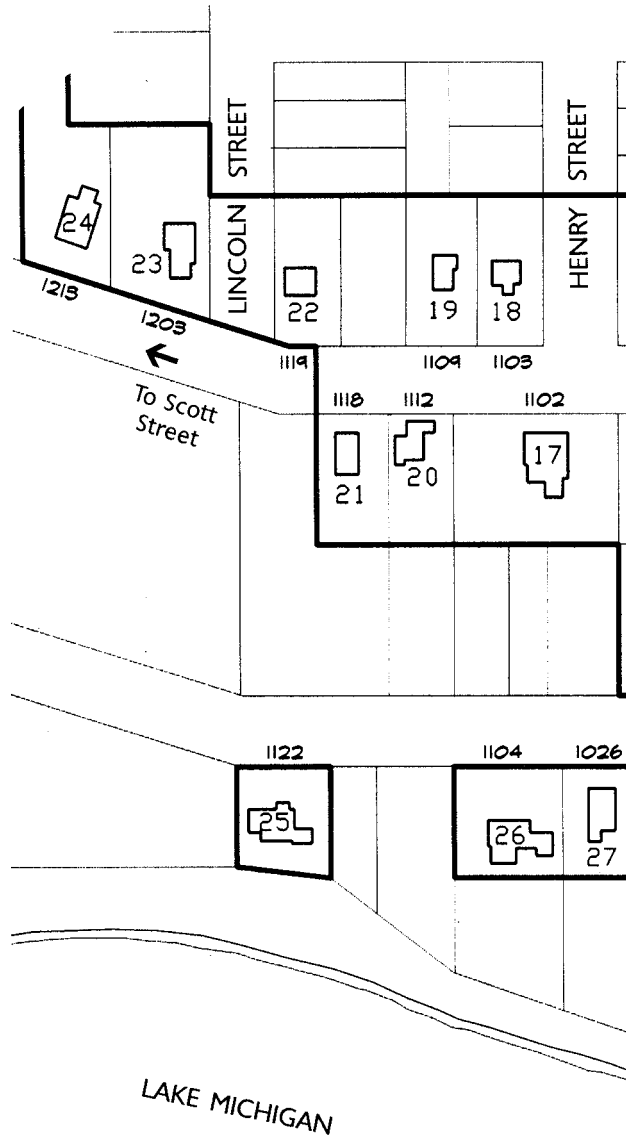

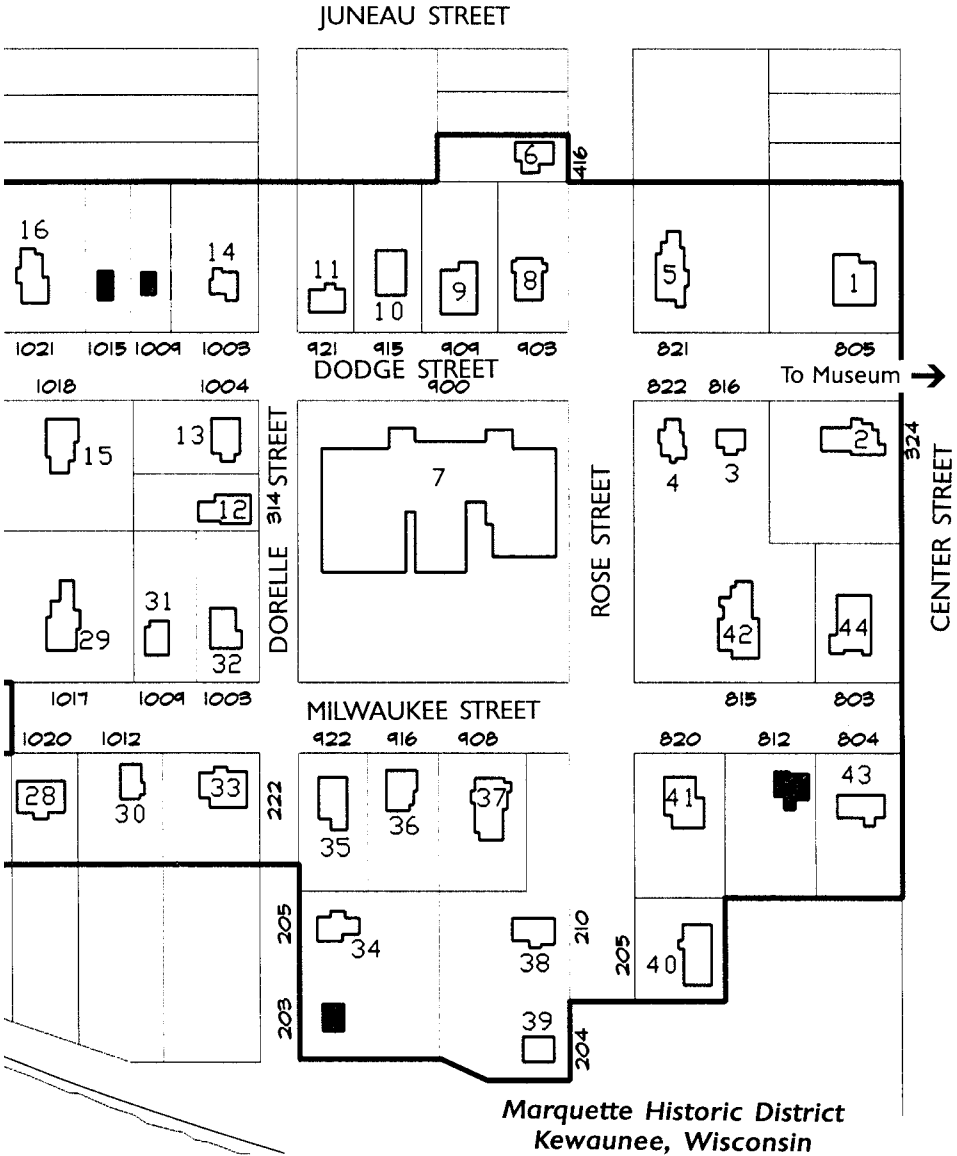

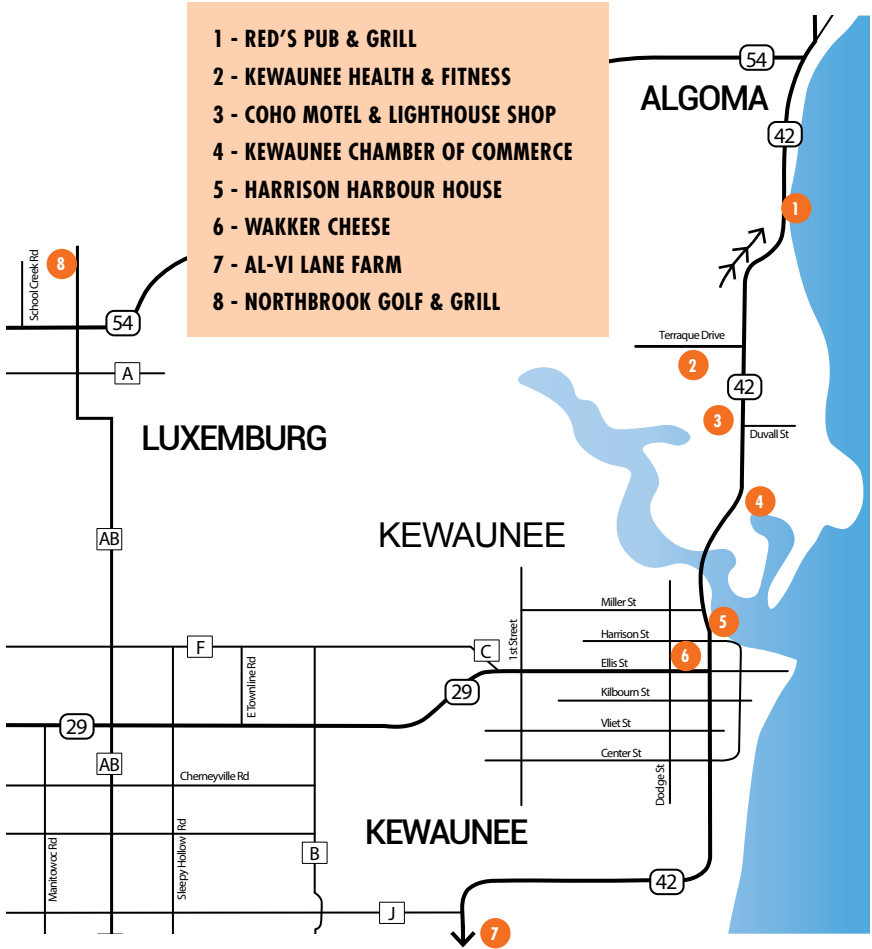

A SCENIC SHORTCUT TO THE PENINSULA AWAITS!

Leave I-43 behind and take in the countryside. Use exit 149, head into downtown Manitowoc and pick up Scenic HWY 42 at Waldo Blvd. Head north and travel the scenic Lake Michigan shoreline through Manitowoc, Two Rivers, Kewaunee and Algoma. This is one of the most beautiful drives in the state of Wisconsin.

MANITOWOC: COAST FOR A WHILE

A coastal destination with a deep maritime history. A place where clean breezes off Lake Michigan keep summers cool and turn the fall season into an explosion of color, and where winter works its magic. Fun for the whole family.

Tour the **Wisconsin Maritime Museum**, a fully restored World War II submarine, operate a steam engine, and time-travel back to a 19th century shipbuilding town—all at the region's only Smithsonian affiliate and largest maritime museum. The **Manitowoc Breakwater Lighthouse** makes for a nice stroll on a summer day, and is a favorite place to take photos.

Travelers on the **Mariners Trail** will be spoiled with beautiful vistas of beaches, parks, forests and the sparkling waters of Lake Michigan. Adding to the scenic landscapes are several trailside gardens and public art pieces. The 6-mile paved pathway traces the shoreline of the Great Lake, connecting the cities of Manitowoc and Two Rivers.

TWO RIVERS: AND THEN I SAW THE LAKE...

Two Rivers is defined by water where the scenic East & West Twin Rivers meet at a sandy point extending into Lake Michigan. **Neshotah Beach** is a beautiful 50 acre groomed sand beach on Lake Michigan with areas for swimming, volleyball, and launching jet skis and kayaks. There are also sports areas, playgrounds, the Rawley Point bike trail, horseshoe pits, four shelters, and picnic areas with tables and grills.

Rogers Street Fishing Village is home to the **Two Rivers North Pier Lighthouse**, the only example of a wood pierhead light surviving on the Upper Great Lakes. Named after one of Manitowoc County's first settlers Peter Rawley, **Rawley Point Lighthouse at Point Beach State Forest** is among the brightest signals on the Great Lakes rising 113 feet above the water.

The **Rawley Point Trail** is a winding, hard-packed limestone pathway from the harbor town of Two Rivers on the shores of Lake Michigan to Point Beach State Forest. The 6-mile, sometimes hilly, trail offers scenic views of the lake, beaches, dunes and forests.

KEWAUNEE: A QUIET & PICTURESQUE COMMUNITY

The **Marquette Historical District**, a distinctive residential neighborhood of fine homes located within the heart of Kewaunee, will greet you upon entrance to the city. Take a self-guided walking tour of the 43 homes built in this National Register of Historic Places.

Kewaunee Harbor Park, offers visitors a newly renovated seawall and boardwalk, creating a walking path from the historical Kewaunee Lighthouse to the Ahnapee State Trail. Along the seawall is the **Tug Ludington**, one of only five ships still afloat that participated in the D-Day invasion at Normandy Beach. Across the street look for the world's tallest **Grandfather Clock** and the **Fire Museum**.

The **Kewaunee Pierhead Lighthouse** is a beloved community icon and a reminder of the local maritime history shared by the early settlers, shipper-merchants, and recreational enthusiasts of today. **Selner Park Beach** offers the best view of Lake Michigan, the pier and lighthouse and is frequently used by artists for inspiration. The park offers benches, picnic tables, grills, and a playground for pure relaxation and family enjoyment.

ALGOMA: CRESCENT BEACH AND A MILLION DOLLAR VIEW

When you arrive in Algoma, it's hard to miss the gorgeous ½ mile **Crescent Beach and Boardwalk**. Take advantage of the view at one of the many picnic tables and benches that overlook the azure blue waters.

Algoma's downtown is dotted with shops, galleries, and eateries all within walking distance. Take the **River Walk** to stroll the **Ahnapee River** and watch the charter boats and kayaks come in and out of the harbor. The new **Ahnapee State Trail** trailhead is only a few blocks west on the corner of CTY S & 6th St.

In 2007 ten historic downtown buildings were painted with murals reflecting Algoma's culture, advertising, and business past. Pick up the **Historic Algoma Walking Tour** brochure for a self guided tour of buildings and murals.

Originally a square white wooden tower structure built in 1893, the iconic red lighthouse was established in 1908. Individual light keepers worked until it was automated in 1973. Sunrise to sunset, the **Algoma Pierhead Lighthouse** provides spectacular photo opportunities.

The Anadromous Fish Facility In Fall and Spring, make sure you stop by to watch trout and salmon struggle up the fish ladders into special holding tanks for spawning. This facility is run by the Department of Natural Resources. If you stop by on the right day, you will see DNR personnel stripping eggs for the hatchery in the facility. Take a look at the underwater process from a window installed by the Algoma-Kewaunee Great Lakes Sports Fishermen. You also might want to adventure on one of the trails along the river. To get to the facility take Hwy. 29 west, turn right on County C to County F, turn left past Bruemmer Park then turn right on Ransom Moore Lane.

Pioneer and Selner Park Just one block from Kewaunee's downtown area, the parks feature public beaches and swimming areas. The Shrine of Our Lady of Good Help Known as "The Chapel" by the local inhabitants, the Shrine of Our Lady of Good Help is built directly over the site where Mary "The Queen of Heaven" appeared to Adele Brise, a young Belgian immigrant woman, in October of 1859, one year after the Marian apparitions occurred at Lourdes. The Shrine of Our Lady of Good Help is located on 6 acres of peaceful farmland just 15 miles Northwest of Kewaunee in Champion, WI. The Shrine of Our Lady of Good Help is the first and only Marian shrine in the United States that is on the site of an approved apparition of the Blessed Virgin Mary.

TUG LUDINGTON



Made for WWII, the Tug Ludington was built at Jacobson Shipyard in Oyster Bay, New York. In February of 1943 the Keel was laid and the tug was finally finished in October of that same year.

The U.S. Army accepted and christened the tug "Major Wilbur F. Browder" and designated the tug LT-4. The tug's armament consisted of two 50 caliber machine guns mounted above the chartroom and pilothouse.

The tug participated in the D-Day invasion of Normandy, towing ammunition barges across the English Channel. After Normandy it traveled to Cherbourg, France to assist in harbor operations until being sent to Plymouth, England until the end of the war. After the war, it joined the U.S. Army Transportation Corps and returned to Norfolk, Virginia where it continued service along the eastern seaboard.

In 1947, the Corps Of Engineers transferred the tug to Kewaunee, WI and then renamed it the "Tug Ludington". While in Kewaunee it was used in the construction and maintenance of many harbors on the Great Lakes. The Tug has towed a wide variety of floating equipment. It is estimated that the Tug has hauled over 1 million tons of cargo.

The Tug now rests in Harbor Park in downtown Kewaunee and is open to visitors from June until Labor Day. The Tug is registered in the National and State Register of Historic Places.

KEWAUNEE FIRE DEPARTMENT

Earliest records reveal that Kewaunee's first Fire Department was organized on March 20, 1870. The department consisted of two groups called Fire Company No. 1 and Hook and Ladder Company No. 1. Equipment used by the firemen at the time were buckets, axes, shovels and ladders. That same year, the City of Kewaunee



purchased a used "Hand Tub" pumping engine from the City of Milwaukee. The "Hand-Tub" was built as the #266 in 1845 by W.C. Hunneman & Co. of Boston. In 1884 a new hand fire engine arrived from New York. In 1898 both volunteer organizations, the Fire Company and the Hook and Ladder Company of Kewaunee, sent notice to the common council of being dissolved, leaving the city without any organization to man the fire apparatus in the event of fire. The mayor appointed thirty able bodied men to act as a temporary fire department. The city quickly authorized the purchase of a new American Steam Fire Engine from New York, followed by an ordinance establishing and regulating the Kewaunee Fire Department.

Today, the fire department has grown with manpower and equipment to offer fire protection to a 60 square mile area in Kewaunee County, with an average population of approximately 5000 people. The fire protection territory includes the City of Kewaunee, Townships of West Kewaunee, Pierce, Casco and the Kewaunee Power Station. The fire department has eight pieces of motorized fire apparatus available and 38 firefighters who carry radio pagers to be notified in the case of a fire.

The fire department museum is a newly constructed building show piece where historical antique fire apparatus is on display. Fire department history is available for public viewing as wall mounted pictures, antique fire apparatus and equipment are there to see. Taking us back into time is the actual 1845 "Hand-Tub" pumping engine purchased from the City of Milwaukee, the original 1884 hand pumper, a 1908 hand drawn wheeled Hose Cart, and a 1927 American LaFrance pumping engine, still in working condition. The museum is located next to the giant Grandfather Clock and Pavilion in downtown Kewaunee.

The fire department museum is a newly constructed building show piece where historical antique fire apparatus is on display. Fire department history is available for public viewing as wall mounted pictures, antique fire apparatus and equipment are there to see. GRANDFATHER CLOCK



The 35' 10" tall grandfather clock in Kewaunee was built in 1976 (bi-centennial) by Svoboda Industries as a hallmark of their business and a gift to the people of Kewaunee. It was built by Jake Schlies with the help of his son, Rodney. In 1984, a new bridge was built in Kewaunee and Svoboda would move its business and the clock to their new Top of the Hill Shop located on Hwy 42 on the northeast edge of Kewaunee. Svoboda's closed the shop and the clock stayed behind and was neglected for more than a decade before selling the property to the Kewaunee County Sherriff's Department in 2013. The clock would now be forced to relocate or be dismantled permanently since the Sherriff's Department planned on using the building for storage. This created a whirlwind of excitement since other cities had interest in taking the clock out of Kewaunee to be restored and used.

Jason Jelinek began a grass root movement using local news outlets and social media to garner attention and support to save a historic piece of Kewaunee, but also a true Americana road side attraction. With full support of Sherriff Matt Joski and soon after Mayor John Blaha, approval to move the clock to its new home at the corner of Miller Street and Hwy 42/Milwaukee Street at the head of the Anhapee Trail was unanimously voted for by the city council in March 2013.

The clock was dismantled in June 2013 for restoration. The body, which was mostly made of redwood, was rotted and replaced with marine grade plywood. A new footing was poured and the steel I-beam backbone inside the clock had extra support struts welded in for bolting to the footing. The ornate clock head was restored through the winter mainly by Dale (Whitey) Vandermoss and his brother, Mike Vandermoss, whom recreated some of the large spindles, coved and crowned moldings by hand. While the outside was being repaired, the German made motors of the clock were looked over by Hacker Berkovitz and made sure they were all keeping time.

On August 27, 2014, the clock body and head were raised in its current home downtown Kewaunee facing the harbor. It would stand alone through the winter of 2014/2015. On May 1, 2015, two pavilion roofs were erected off of each backside of the clock. One running north and south, the other east and west.

On July 30th at 1:00 P.M. the clock was officially started and has been keeping perfect time since. As of December 5, 2015, a sound system was donated and chimes along with music for the seasons can be heard on the quarter, half, and full hours.

All funding to move and restore the clock was provided by donations from local citizens. A true testament to the attachment locals had with the icon. Over \$30,000 was raised and funds continue to support the beautification of the Anhapee Trail head area as well as general maintenance, signage, and electricity. There are many local craftsmen and women, construction companies, including Merten's Construction and Concrete, Schlies Construction and Remodeling, Scott's Industrial Coatings, and Northern Sound and Video, government officials and supporters that deserve a great amount of thanks for the volunteer work that was given so graciously! Thank you all so much! This is the world's Tallest Grandfather Clock!

KEWAUNEE PIERHEAD LIGHTHOUSE



Imagine thick blankets of fog covering the entrance to the harbor, so thick that people could not see their hand in front of them. These foggy conditions along Kewaunee's shore could make boat travel dangerous. Over 1,000 shipwrecks have occurred on Lake Michigan, with some of those being just outside the Kewaunee Harbor.

In 1854 the Wisconsin legislature called for a lighthouse at or near Kewaunee to improve the safety of the harbor and steamships. A full plan to improve the harbor was not put into place until the 1880s.

In 1891, a pair of range lights were installed that helped guide people in from the fog. The next year, construction of the piers and dredging of the river began. There was an elevated catwalk where the lighthouse keeper would enter the lighthouse. The catwalk ran the length of the pier and was used to help keep the lighthouse keeper safe from fierce storms.

In 1909, a diaphone fog signal horn was installed in the front range light. Also at this time, a large fog signal building was built in front of the lighthouse. This addition contained the steam power for the fog signal and doubled as housing for the keeper as he kept watch on long, foggy nights. Prior to the horn, it is said that keepers would walk to the end of the pier and banged boards to warn sailors. A 70 foot steel range light tower was added in 1912.

In 1931, the front range lights were eliminated and a new 45 foot focal plane was constructed on the roof of the 1909 fog horn addition. It is thought that the old fifth order Fresnel lenses were moved into the new tower at this time.

Between 1931 and 2017, there were very few major changes. The catwalk was removed and the door was moved to pier level. In 1981 the light was automated by an electric four-bulb changer. The diaphone fog signal was also removed from the tower in 1981. In 1972, Kewaunee native James Lipsky recorded 31 minutes of the foghorn's unique sound. Today, the recording is enshrined in the Library of Congress's National Recording Registry. The recording can also be found on YouTube at www.youtube.com/watch?v=QrMAyQF7JNl.

Still serving as a functioning lighthouse, the City of Kewaunee received ownership from the National Park Service in 2011. In 2015, the City was awarded a state grant to be used toward the repair of the harbor seawall and restoration of the lighthouse. The main focus was to protect the structure from the elements and curtail further damage.

In 2017, a number of projects on the Lighthouse were completed. The asphalt roof was replaced with a new metal roof system. Rotted roof sheathing was replaced and a complete ice and water shield synthetic layer was laid. Along with the extensive roof repairs, exterior wood elements were stripped of their paint, repaired or replaced if needed, then primed and painted. Corrugated metal

siding on the tower exterior was replaced with fiber/cement board siding to give the structure a cleaner, more uniform look. Plywood and plexi-glass enclosures on window openings were removed, allowing more light into the interior and new aluminum storm windows were installed to keep the elements out. The existing window units remain in place, protected from further deterioration for a future restoration project.

In 2018, a historic walking tour was established featuring the Lighthouse. The Don and Jean Smith Lighthouse Park was developed providing space for donor pavers and the memorial anchor commemorating the sinking of the Emerald and Dickinson. The lead paint and asbestos was removed from the interior of the lighthouse.

On June 6, 2019, the Fresnel Lens dating back to 1891 was removed and replaced with an LED light by the US Coast Guard. The lens now resides in a handcrafted display case built by Dan Vogel located at the Kewaunee County Historical Society Building.

In the spring of 2020, a custom made historic replica entrance door costing \$11,689.00 was installed. It is the original Rock Garden Green with polycarbonate windows. A new threshold was also fashioned to accommodate the door.

The outside entrance platform was extended in 2021 to allow for safer entrance and exit of the lighthouse. Additional railings were installed inside the lighthouse for safer transitions in some of the laddered areas. To help complete the walking tour, the area from the Tug Ludington to the Lighthouse was connected with a crushed limestone path.

Plans for 2022 are on hold due to the anticipation of being included on the National Historic Register.

Kewaunee's square lighthouse, resembling the Holland Lighthouse, is white with a red roof. It is steel frame construction and covered in ¼ inch steel plate. The tower is 43 feet high and there are currently no living quarters in the house. The lighthouse is located on the south pier and on the north pier is a navigation marker.

What makes Kewaunee County's wines some of the best in Midwest? Is it the fact that the average rainfall is within one inch of Bordeaux, France? Or that the hours of daylight are the same as Tuscany, Italy? Or is it the cool waters of Lake Michigan during the summer? Or is it the perfect soil for growing the many varieties of grapes?

The answer... YES! Kewaunee County, and the entire northeastern Wisconsin area is part of the Wisconsin Ledge, which is an American Viticultural Area (AVA) since 2012. The Wisconsin Ledge is the third AVA designation in the State.



The history of wineries in Kewaunee County begins with von Stiehl Winery in Algoma. In 1967, Dr. Stiehl opened the first winery in the state and produced his wines from Door County cherries and apples. Doc Stiehl sold the winery to Bill and Sandy Schmilg in 1981. At that time, the winery produces about 5,000 gallons of wine a year with 90% of it cherry.

In 2003, Bill and Sandy sold the winery to their sons, Aric and Brad. Today, fifty years later, von Stiehl Winery produces forty grape and fruit wines. The latest technology is used in producing over 75,000 gallons of wine, while still paying attention to detail, just as Doc did in the early days. Today, you can take a tour of the winery, sip a glass of wine on the three-tier terrace over looking the Algoma lighthouse, take part in the many pairing events throughout the year and annually in September, celebrate with us at the Wet Whistle Wine Fest and take part in the Grape Stomp!

What started as a dream for two newlyweds on their California honeymoon in 1994 has turned into a pioneering vineyard and winery in the heart of Kewaunee County since 2005. Steve and Maria Johnson, while sitting in the middle of a vineyard turned to each other and said, "Why don't we do the same thing back home in Wisconsin?" At that time, this notion of pioneering a world class wine region in the heart of the "Frozen Tundra" seemed like an impossibility to most everyone.

Since that time, Steve, Maria and their three children have spent the last 16 years growing grapes and making wines that are winning international acclaim. Our namesake is also our actual geographic location, Parallel 44 or 44 degrees North Latitude. Follow this same line of latitude and you would find yourself walking

through vineyards of Bordeaux, France and Tuscany, Italy. This means you will find the same perfect grape growing conditions (growing degree days, length of daylight and precipitation) here in Kewaunee County.

We invite you to walk the vineyards, take a tour, or relax on the patio overlooking our 10 acre vineyard. At Parallel 44 you will learn, enjoy, and experience why we are the largest producer of "Wisconsin Ledge" Wines in the state. Virtually every wine you taste is "Wisconsin" from ground to glass. Become a wine pioneer with us and immerse yourself with wines and stories that are world class and distinctly and proudly Wisconsin!



The newest winery in Kewaunee County is Cold Country Vines & Wines, which is located four miles from Lake Michigan, perched along the edge of the beautiful East Twin River Valley. Jay Stoeger grew up helping his grandparents and his uncles grow grapes and other fruit, much of it for wine in the Marinette/Peshtigo area. Concord grapes were the most cold hardy, but even those would only produce a crop about three out of every five years. Most of the other varieties grown back then were lucky to produce a crop one year out of every five. Sadly, Jay could only dream about growing grapes and making wine. That is until the late 1990's when a Wisconsin native, Elmer Swenson, revolutionized grape growing in the Upper Midwest and other cold and short-seasoned regions. He started cross breeding and developing grape varieties that would not only survive the cold Wisconsin winters, but would also make a great wine.

Once Jay became aware of these new, cold hardy grapes, his dream could finally become reality. Since Jay's wife Kay shared his passion for wine, it didn't take much convincing to get her to agree to start planting grapes and planning the conversion of their horse barn into a winery. Today, it stands beautifully in the center of their 16-acre vineyard.

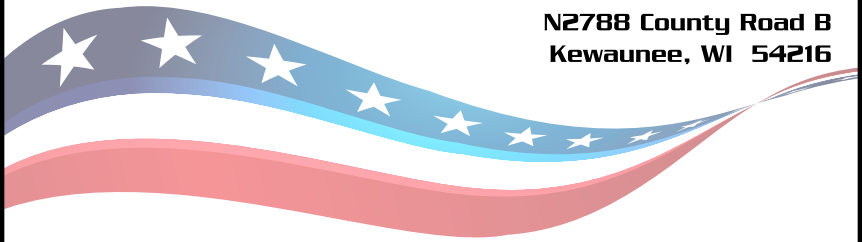
